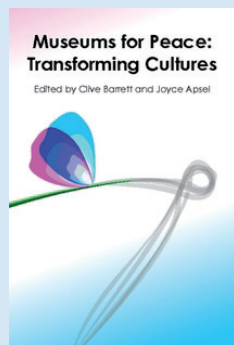
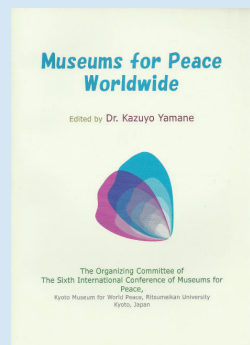

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WHO WE ARE

The International Network of Museums for Peace (INMP) is an NGO, associated with the UN Department of Public Information in New York.

The INMP was created in 1992 during an international conference which brought together for the first time the management and staff of peace museums, anti-war museums and similar institutions worldwide.

In 2009 the INMP was established as a foundation in The Hague and opened its secretariat in a modern office near the Peace Palace in 2010.

The INMP has a general coordinator and is governed by an executive board consisting of ten members, and an advisory committee of twelve members, representing museums for peace around the world. MUSEUMS FOR PEACE

Museums for peace are non-profit educational institutions that promote a culture of peace through collecting, displaying and interpreting peace related material. Museums for peace inform the public about peace and nonviolence using illustrations from the lives of individuals, the work of organisations, campaigns, historical events, etc.

The INMP also includes peace gardens and other peace related sites, centres and institutions which are involved in public peace education through exhibitions, documentation and similar activities.

AIMS

The INMP aims to contribute to world peace by strengthening the work of museums, galleries and libraries working for peace (collectively called museums for peace). An important goal is to promote cooperation between peace museums, related institutions and individuals worldwide for the exchange of information, experience, materials and exhibitions, and to create joint exhibitions.

The INMP also encourages the establishment of new museums for peace in all parts of the world.
